PARISH LETTER

God's word... sharper than a two-edged sword

The children sat cross-legged, hands in their laps eyes rivetted on the Sunday school teacher. Under their arms was a tightly held bible. The game was 'drawn swords'. And before you worry the name comes from the title of this article.

Eyes rivetted and silence, waiting for a bible reference from the teacher, and then, the command: 'Draw Swords'. Instantly bibles are whipped out, and little fingers scramble to find the verse. The winner jumps up and reads it out. It was a great game and a brilliant way to learn my way around the bible.

Much has been made in past weeks about Donald Trump's holding of a bible. You may have seen the clip from the late late show hosted by James Cordon. He invited his dad Malcolm, a onetime Christian book salesman, to give a bible-holding demonstration: under the arm to pull out quickly and return if it's not wanted; held close to the heart, a precious gift; sandwiched between outstretched hands like taking an oath; held open resting in two hands an offering of love. It was beautifully done and got me thinking about how we read our bibles today.

Is your bible in lockdown, or is it out regularly? How do you like to hold your bible? I like mine open. Of course we may have electronic versions and they are brilliant, but not the same as actually holding the book and turning the pages. I expect some of us have bibles which carry deep significance – they are precious gifts to remind us of a special person or occasion. The words they contain, the word of God, is even more precious and life-giving and we need to feed on it.

There are lots of ways to read the bible, what is important is that we do read it. Here are some ideas:

Look up the readings for the Sunday zoom service and read the whole chapter not just the bit given of the service.

Find a psalm that really speaks to you: try some of these 4, 8, 23, 34, 42, 48, 121, 134, 150

Choose a New Testament letter and imagine it is being written to our parish or to you: Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians or Colossians would be great a great choice

Down load the Church of England Daily prayer app and read what thousands of other Christians are reading every day:
https://play.google.com/store/apps/details?id=com.aimermedia.dailyprayer&hl=en_GB

However you read, let's get our bibles out of lockdown and place them in open hands so we can enjoy God's word, sharper than a two-edged sword. Read slowly and savour the good news God has for us. So, get your bible, hold it tightly under your arm, sit comfortably (you don't have to be cross-legged on the floor) Are you ready.... Here are three references for you:

John 3:16 Draw Swords!

Hebrews 4:12.... Draw Swords!

Psalm 37: 1-8.... Draw Swords! (this is Malcolm Cordon's favourite passage)

How about sharing your favourite verses with the WhatsApp group?


To everyone who knew Anthony, his death came as a great shock and because of the Lockdown many from the Cray Parish couldn't attend or pay their respects.


Bible Bite

A short story from the Bible


It can be read in the Bible in

David crept over and cut a piece off Saul's robe.




Then David felt bad.

My dear Nephew Darren

When producing material for your magazine or church services, beware the computer spell-checker. We once let our own system check a Christmas carol sheet and, on the night, found ourselves obliged to sing “away in a manager”, mangers apparently being unknown to our machine.

If you use special sheets regularly, it seems a law of nature – as with metal coat hangers - that they all intermingle while no one is watching. HIGH DAYS AND HOLY DAYS

15th July - St Swithun (or Swithin), saint for a rainy day

St Swithun is apparently the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15th July, it will then rain for 40 days after that. It all began when Swithun was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 by King Ethelwulf of Wessex. It was an important posting: Winchester was the capital of Wessex, and during the 10 years Swithun was there, Wessex became the most important kingdom of England.

During his life, instead of washing out people's summer holidays, and damping down their spirits, Swithun seems to have done a lot of good. He was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, he asked that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door.

If he had been left there in peace, who knows how many rainy summers the English may have been spared over the last 1000 years. But, no, it was decided to move Swithun. By now, the 960s, Winchester had become the first monastic cathedral chapter in England, and the newly installed monks wanted Swithun in the cathedral with them. So finally, on 15 July 971, his bones were dug up and Swithun was translated into the cathedral.

That same day many people claimed to have had miraculous cures. Certainly everyone got wet, for the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester cathedral. His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the middle ages. The shrine was destroyed during the Reformation and restored in 1962. There are 58 ancient dedications to Swithun in England.

22nd July The 'Other' Mary

As the traditional Easter story is remembered again this month, you may notice that there is one name that frequently occurs. It is that of the 'other' Mary – not the mother of Jesus but Mary of Magdala, who stood by her at the cross and became the first human being, male or female, actually to meet the risen Christ. That's quite a record for a woman who,

the Gospels tell us, had been delivered by Jesus from ‘seven devils’. As a result, her devotion to Him was total and her grief at His death overwhelming.

In church history Mary Magdalene became the ‘fallen woman’, a harlot who was rescued and forgiven by Jesus. And while there is no evidence to prove she was a ‘fallen woman’, the contrast is sublime: Mary the virgin mother, the symbol of purity and Mary Magdalene, the scarlet woman who was saved and forgiven, the symbol of redemption. Surely, we all fall somewhere between those two extremes.

What we do know is that the two Marys stood together at the cross, the Blessed Virgin and the woman rescued from who knows what darkness and despair.

The second great moment for her was as unexpected as it was momentous. She had gone with other women to the tomb of Jesus and found it empty. An angelic figure told them that Jesus was not there, He had risen – and the others drifted off. But Mary stayed, reluctant to leave it like that. She became aware of a man nearby, whom she took to be the gardener. She explained to Him that the body of ‘her Lord’ had been taken away and she didn’t know where to find Him.

The man simply said her name ‘Mary’ and she instantly realised it was Jesus. She made to hug Him, but He told her not to touch Him because His resurrection was not yet complete. She was, however, to go to the male disciples and tell them she had met Him. She did – but they couldn’t believe her.

Her words – ‘I have seen the Lord’ – echo down the centuries, the very beating heart of the Christian gospel.
